

PILGRIMAGE FEAST DAYS IN ANCIENT ISRAEL

Three times a year, the men were required to attend a feast in Jerusalem. These soon became family events when households and neighbors traveled together to celebrate God's deliverance and provision.

Feast of Unleavened Bread (Passover)

A meal that re-enacts the exodus from Egypt.
Celebrates God delivering them from slavery.
Leviticus 23:4–8, Deuteronomy 16:2–4.

Feast of Weeks (Pentecost)

A harvest festival celebrating God's provision.
Comes fifty days after Passover.
Leviticus 23, Deuteronomy 16:16.

Feast of Tabernacles (Feast of Booths)

A seven-day feast.
Israelites set up and live in tents or booths in Jerusalem for a week.
Reenacts Israel's journey from Egypt to Canaan.
Leviticus 23:34, Deuteronomy 16:16.
